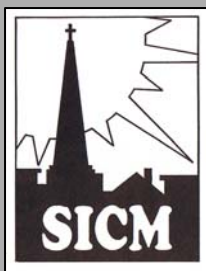

Spiritually Sound, Physically Fit Takes Off

Time to get fit in body as well as spirit! The Schenectady Inner City Ministry (SICM), in conjunction with several congregations and the Cornell Cooperative Extension and the Schenectady YWCA, is offering a physical fitness and nutrition program to help improve cardiovascular risk factors such as weight and blood pressure rates among members. SICM was able to expand the program this year with additional congregations and the Schenectady Damien Center (part of SICM) through a special grant from the NYS Health Foundation.

Rev. Van Stuart is coordinating the program. Groups involved (and their coordinators) include the Damien Center (Will Christman), Friendship Baptist Church (Phyllis Smalls), Mt. Olivet Missionary Baptist (Virginia LaBad), and Macedonia Baptist (Rev. Harris).

The basic premise of Spiritually Sound-Physically Fit is that many people have the proper information about ways to improve their health but need support in changing habits. What is needed is not more education, but a strategy. The values and beliefs shared in religious congregations make them



an ideal "network" for fostering and encouraging a healthier lifestyle. Participants keep track of daily fitness activities, and receive support from a fitness buddy. They have periodic weight, body mass and blood pressure checks, and receive nutrition tips and recipe modifications. Prizes will be awarded for meeting personal goals!

Benefits of participating in this program include: weight loss, reduction of hypertension, decreased risks of developing diabetes, decreased risk of heart disease, and in general, feel better and have fun! The program held a kick-off event with registration, demonstrations of heart-healthy foods and exercise, setting up a buddy system; and other activities. The program will conclude with a celebratory dinner and program in November..



Reception Held For Food Pantry Donors

On Wednesday, June 4, star donors to the SICM Emergency Food Pantry were honored at a reception. Held at the Pantry, the program included tours of the facility, refreshments, and remarks by Chris Rush, Co-Chair of the Food Task Force, Reverend Phil Grigsby, SICM Executive Director, and John Held, SICM President. John Held unveiled and presented a plaque with the names of the donors on it, to be displayed at the Pantry.

To date, \$180,000 of the \$280,000 loan has been raised. Therefore, \$100,000 is still needed to reach the goal.

Ministry Notes



One of the more unexpected events to share with you from this summer was coordinating the final affairs for Jordan Hess. I first knew Jordan through the Damien Center about a decade ago.

He periodically stayed in and out of contact. He asked me to coordinate his final affairs since he had no family left. Most recently he was out of contact although I had a premonition by wondering what was up with him. Jordan was challenged all his life with a developmental disability. Literally thrown out by his mother and father, he became a mental health advocate, often on behalf of those in the VA system (he was a veteran). After his death I was blessed to get access to papers he always kept to himself. He struggled with belief and faith, but confessed ultimately faith in God. He saw himself from his own struggles and sufferings as a "wounded healer" as did Henri Nouwen. Jordan wrote about "Wounded Healers":

"We must all struggle with God to get in to heaven, as Jacob did with the angel. But because it is not possible to struggle with God and come away the victor every one in heaven has a wound. This is a connection we all have with

the cross.

The wound may be spiritual, psychological or physical.

If you think Christ's message is just rewards you will be disappointed.

He came to share our suffering, but we must also share His suffering."

Jordan, like most of us, searched for home, it's just that his search was more visible than most of us. He joined at least 5 churches around here at one point (and likely more—that's all the ones I know!). He would alternately delight and infuriate. I shared during the memorial service his piece called "The Enigma":

"A woman once gave birth, but no one knew what it was.

They were not sure if it was male or female, young or old, beautiful or ugly, wise or stupid.

Many people avoided it because it was different, and therefore made them uncomfortable.

It searched all its life for some place it was accepted and could call home. There were some who tried to love it, but it never lasted, and in the end was always left alone.

It was very sad and lonely.

But when it died, God opened his arms and said come to me my child, and it was home."

I hope some time to look at the book Jordan wrote on the mental health system. At the memorial service we gave thanks for his life, and are still discovering his legacy. While challenging, we are fortunate for the lives of people who come along our path in SICM.

Food Pantry Begins Mass Distribution in May

The SICM Food Pantry started Mass Distribution in May of 2008. After a year at our new location we finally had room to try this new program out through the Regional Food Bank. On the last Thursday of each month, the RFB delivers 12 pallets of "hard to move items," especially produce that they don't want to spoil, as well as yogurt, cottage cheese, juice and bread. Each person is given a box and proceeds to each pallet and is given enough of every item according to their family size. The items change each month and this does not count against the person's regular pantry visit of 4 times a year. The food pantry is not open for regular business on that day and NO transportation is provided! The stats are proof of the success of this program so far:
