Throughout 2017 SICM has worked diligently on meeting the needs of the folks within the inner city and Schenectady County who are lacking many of the basic comforts that we who have so much take for granted. We accomplished this through the many programs that we operate, including the Food Pantry, Internship Program, Summer Meals, Summer Camp at Steinmetz Park, Schenectady County Embraces Diversity (SCED), the Damien Center of Schenectady, and other initiatives. SICM also conducted a monthly Assembly meeting for its member congregations to share information on current and new social justice initiatives.

During the year, SICM has worked with community partners on a number of fundraising events to fund the many programs that it operates. These include, Souper Bowl, CROP Walk, Empty Bowls, The Knight's of Columbus Charity Golf Classic, Harvest for the Pantry, and the Concert of Thanksgiving.

As SICM prepared to enter its next 50 years, it has been working on plans to reconfigure the agency to meet the growing needs of the community. Congregations, staff and volunteers have been and continue to be involved in this arduous undertaking.

The work of SICM cannot occur without the assistance of its many volunteers, staff and community partners. It is because of the hard work of these folks that SICM can perform the many good things that it does. In closing, while 2017 was a good year for SICM in carrying out its mission and goals, we are looking forward to an even better 2018 for fulfilling its mission's goals.



Message from Rev. Phillip Grigsby Executive Director



Reflections at 50 Years

In the mid 1960's concerned congregational and community members gathered to form a new expression for direct action, a "hands on" approach to community ministry. The more they met, the larger grew their vision. What came about is far beyond what they ever imagined:

- Originally a Four Parish Fellowship (comprised of Duryee Memorial AME Zion, Emmanuel Baptist, First United Methodist, and Friendship Baptist) gathered and quickly became 12, and now 51 congregations seeking to "do those things together we can best do together."
- Roman Catholics and Protestants, originally suspicious, after Vatican II discovered we had much more in common than what divides us. The ecumenical movement took shape. Now we are enriched by multi-faith partnerships and relationships.
- Many able and skilled leaders over the years helped develop and lead SICM. We recall "the communion of saints" on whose shoulders we stand today. We remember the Rev. Dr. Carl B. Taylor, Mother Georgetta Dix, Pieter VonHermann, Willis Rexford, Rachel Rowe, Lloyd Rivest, Mary Schieble, Phyllis Clas, Cay Raycroft, Bertha Comanzo, Fr. Michael Hogan, David Nelson, Rev. Don Stake, George Roman and many more who have gone before us faith and in a very real way guide us still today.
- A direct and effective help for those with "too much month at the end of the money" with a model food program. While we give "a fish for a day" we also "teach to fish" with a variety of resources; it is a neighborhood resource center. The SICM community garden near the pantry enables families to grow their own food.
- A 'social entrepreneur' response to community concerns by the development over the years of such initiatives as Safe Inc. (human trafficking), Bethesda House (homelessness), the Community Land Trust (affordable housing), Nutrition Outreach and Education (accessing food programs), and more.
- Leadership in initiatives to improve police and community relations, with other community issues, and addressing racism/diversity in a now more diverse community (Schenectady County Embraces Diversity).
- Initiatives for health and wellness (for example, the Spiritually Sound Physically Fit program, Safe Parks and Edible Playgrounds, Healthy Homes, the Schenectady Damien Center, healthier options at the SICM Food Program).
- Addressing childhood hunger through the county's only Summer Food Service program providing breakfast and lunch at 28 sites, fixed and mobile.
- Educating children through a summer camp helping youth avoid "the summer slide" and teaching faith values as well.
- · and more!

We can't do it alone. We do it through partnerships and broad community support. Thank you! As we look ahead, we celebrate these partnerships and many supporters to not only sustain important work but develop new initiatives. "There is yet light and truth to break forth" the old covenant spoke. "Behold this new thing I am doing" says God in Revelations. If we are fortunate, we can "catch on to God's coattails" and be at those places where hope is affirmed, where community is developed, where those in crisis get a hand, and people of faith bear witness.

Programs

SICM Food Program

The SICM Food Program addressed public health needs such as hunger and nutrition, encouraged healthy behaviors, and advocated to improve the lives of high-need populations. The SICM Food Program included the Emergency Food Pantry with support services, a Community Garden, and a Summer Meals program for anyone under 19.

Vision: Everyone has access to healthy, nutritious food.

Emergency Food Pantry



The Pantry was open four days a week and provided guests who were in need of temporary and emergency food with nutritious groceries. Once a month mass food distribution was offered. Van rides home were offered to guests.

Community organizations offered information and assistance at the pantry to help guests learn about community resources.

The panty offered special programs, such as Senior Connect, Sit & Knit and food deliveries to the homebound.

Many community organizations and individuals volunteered to assist the pantry and warehouse.

Goal: Gardeners save money and learn how to grow their own fruits and

Community residents were offered 18 plots to grow their own fresh fruits and vegetables. SICM provided support through a staff person and volunteers who prepared the soil for planting. The garden operated April through November. Each gardener was responsible for maintaining their own plot. Many donated produce to the pantry. Community and faith-based organizations and individuals volunteered to assist gardeners.

Summer Meals

Vision: Ensure that high priority children of Schenectady receive a nutritious meal during the summer.

Summer Meals provided free breakfasts and/or lunches to youth 19 and younger at parks, public housing locations, and churches. The program also offered mobile site locations throughout the county. Teams of SICM summer staff, interns and volunteers served the meals and engaged children with fun activities, such as arts and crafts, reading, etc. The program started at the end of the school year and continued until school restarted.

Summer Youth Camp at Steinmetz Park

Vision: Children have a safe and nurturing experience that builds confidence and self-reliance.

SICM's Summer Day Camp at Steinmetz Park was a free faith-based camp for children ages 7—12 that offered engaging hands-on activities designed to motivate campers and take advantage of the beautiful natural surroundings at Steinmetz Park. The 45-acre park resources included a large stocked pond with beautifully sculptured nature walks, a playground, and picnic areas. The camp offered treasure hunts, arts and crafts, music, fishing, recreation activities, and more. Off-site field trips were offered. The program included breakfast and lunch.





The camp was open from 9:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. for six weeks (July through August.) It was open and staffed with professionals, interns and volunteers; the SICM camp offered a one to six ratio of staff to children.

The Summer Internship Program benefited high school and college-age students by offering part-time and full-time positions. It offered the experience of observing and responding to those in need at SICM and other non-profit programs. The experience was especially valuable for the community who reaped the benefits of the students' hard work in various programs, and SICM benefited from having "many hands to make light work." Congregations benefited from having their youth reaching out to the residents of Schenectady.

Schenectady County Embraces Diversity (SCED)

Vision: Diversity is our strength for change.

SCED was a program for both youth and adults designed to create new ways to talk about Schenectady County's increasingly diverse community. Participants gained a deeper understanding of the issues that divide populations and identified possible solutions to address their concerns.

SCED provided support to local networks and sought change through advocacy. Program offered <u>Dialogue to Change</u> curriculum for adults and <u>Study Circles</u> for middle and high school students. The small groups of 12-15 people included structured sessions led by trained peer facilitators. Participants offered personal stories leading to shared understanding of differences. They shared knowledge, resources and learned decision-making skills, then developed plans of action for change.

Impact & Results— School Year: 2016-17

Study Circles

5 middle schools — 89% of participants stated they felt they can do something to improve relations

6 high schools — 93% of participants stated they had a better understanding of different types of maltreatment
