FOOD INSECURITY ON THE MOVE

Through our delivery system we were able to derive statistics on what areas are particularly affected by food insecurity, urban food deserts, and the Covid-19 pandemic. We now have a better focus on what neighborhoods to place our services like Mass Distribution at Our Lady of Mt. Carmel for the Mt. Pleasant and Bellevue neighborhoods, continued deliveries for Seniors and those personally impacted by Covid-19 quarantine, and eventually Pop-up Pantries, which will serve different mobile sites throughout the entire county.

Schenectady Urban Farms is offering new memberships for the 2021 growing season. Right now we are cleaning up from the winter and planting sugar snap peas to start. We are getting a lot of compost from a local farmer to add to our beds. One of the early tasks will be turning compost into all our vegetable growing beds. We will also offer a series of orientations at all the

farms as well as Open Hours when the farms will be open for you to come and work. We started giving out the vegetable seeds many supporters helped repackage. We have seeds available if you are looking for some to plant at home or you know someone who could use some seeds.


SiCM Shares The Warmth Thank You to our Community Partners

The Last Word by Rachel Curtis, President of SiCM

Happy Spring! March 13, 2020 is a day that forever changed business as usual. The last year has felt something like the twilight zone. For SiCM, despite the pandemic that has raged on, change and transition have been the focus. The Capital Campaign has made great improvements to the infrastructure of the 837-

839 Albany Street buildings, and is nearly done! I cannot wait to see the community center all ready to roll, and the various innovative community programming that will be made possible through its completion.

The Interfaith Forum held in early February, with representatives from the Sikh, Islamic, Jewish, Pagan, and Christianity religions, was well-attended and informative. I tend to center myself on the idea that love is love. I believe that as we collectively reach toward our higher power(s), we can overcome the evil that the social construct of race has bestowed upon the world. Of course this effort alone is not the complete answer, yet it is certainly part of the equation. For me, along with others, this forum was cathartic - as it was clear that regardless of faith, love and good will toward one another are central to the success of the righteous human experience.

Last summer, as a byproduct of my SiCM Steering membership, and as a part of my work with the Schenectady City School District, I connected one of our summer programs with the Schenectady

Urban Farms. Colleagues and I were able to work on the farm, film ourselves doing so to broadcast for our virtual learners, and deliver fresh organic produce to families who otherwise may not have been able to afford it. As a result, I have decided to become a member for this upcoming growing season. For just \$25, and 2 hours of work per week at any of the three locations, membership is yours! If you care to sponsor a family in need instead or in addition, this is also an honorable option.

SiCM's Social Justice Committee was responsible for the anti-racism statement that has been published on our website. Significantly, the Black Lives Matter banner on the front fence of Albany Street has provided some comfort to our guests, many of whom are from marginalized groups. I use the term 'marginalized' instead of 'minority' here, because it shifts our focus from the number of bodies to power dynamics, systems of oppression, and peoples' shared experiences within them. Schenectady County Embraces Diversity (SCED), with Shirley Readdean and Sr Renee Adamany, CSJ, leading the charge, is getting the next generation of circle facilitators ready for this important work.

I believe the most significant step SiCM has made recently toward an anti-racism commitment is in the hiring of our new Executive Director, Amaury Tañón-Santos. He is committed to racial reconciliation, and will lead the inside of the organization in a way that is reflective of the banner that hangs on the outside. I look forward to the work ahead!
